Writing the Hillmon Case: An Instance of the Legal Storyteller's Predicament

Marianne Wesson, known as Mimi to her friends, holds the position of Professor of Law and Schaden Chair in Experiential Learning at the University of Colorado, where she has also been designated a President's Teaching Scholar. In former times she has been a federal prosecutor, university administrator, and novelist. Three of her novels have been national bestsellers. Her newest book, a work of creative nonfiction called A DEATH AT CROOKED CREEK: THE CASE OF THE COWBOY, THE CIGARMAKER, AND THE LOVE LETTER, will be published in spring 2013. It reconsiders the origins and significance of the Supreme Court's famous 1892 decision in Mutual Life Insurance Company v. Hillmon. When not at work, Mimi lives in Larimer County, Colorado, with her husband, fifteen llamas, assorted dogs and cats, and visiting wildlife.
