The Place: The University of Colorado Law School, Boulder, Colorado

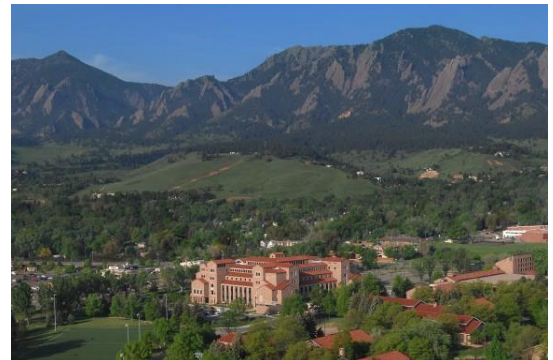
Established in 1892, the University of Colorado Law School is one of the premier public law schools in the United States, with a proud and long tradition in the field of natural resources law. Nestled at the foot of the Rocky Mountains, Colorado Law is ideally situated for the advanced study of natural resources law. The region is home to a rich and diverse wildlife community, boasts abundant reserves of conventional mineral resources, and is a world leader in the production and use of renewable energy. Many of the nation's mightiest rivers begin here and vast tracts of local, state, and federal public lands are literally at your doorstep.

The Program: A Master of Laws (LLM) Degree in Natural Resources Law

The LLM in Natural Resources Law offers students a yearlong, in-depth program covering a wide range of pressing issues: from water management and climate change to habitat protection and energy development. Alongside a diverse student body, LLM candidates complete 26 credit hours in courses relevant to natural resources law and policy. For international students, the program begins in early July with a course on the American legal system specially designed for them. For other students, the program starts in the fall and runs through summer. The program concludes with the preparation of a major research paper suitable for publication.

The Benefits: Study with a World Class Faculty and Work on Cutting-Edge Research

Colorado Law is home to an outstanding faculty and the Natural Resources Law Center (NRLC), a research and policy center founded in 1982. The NRLC is dedicated to informing and influencing natural resources law and policy, with an emphasis on sustainability. LLM students enjoy a unique opportunity to work with the Center's professional staff as well as with the Center for Energy and Environmental Security (CEES), which focuses on energy and environmental security issues. Should they be selected, LLM students also have an opportunity to publish in the *Colorado Law Review* or the *Colorado Journal of International Environmental Law and Policy*, and are welcome to participate in the many endeavors led by the student-run Environmental Law Society.
